Quest for Gold – Ontario Athlete Assistance Program 2008-2009

ATHLETE SELECTION CRITERIA

Quest for Gold – Ontario Athlete Assistance Program 2008-2009 (OAAP) is funded by the Government of Ontario, through the Ministry of Health Promotion (MHP), and operated through the Sport and Recreation Branch. The overarching goal of the *Quest for Gold – OAAP* is directly related to the Enhanced Excellence goals of both *ACTIVE2010* and the *Canadian Sport Policy* – to improve the performance and number of Ontario athletes performing at the national and international level; thereby contributing to the improved performance of Canada at international competitions. Specific objectives of the program are:

- a) To help athletes continue their pursuit of athletic excellence at the highest levels of national and international competition;
- b) To encourage athletes to stay in Ontario to live and train;
- c) To compensate athletes for earnings lost while training;
- d) To enable athletes to successfully pursue excellence in sport while fulfilling their educational goals;
- e) To increase athlete access to improved high performance coaching; and
- f) To enhance training and competitive opportunities available to athletes.

The program will provide direct financial assistance to Ontario junior-aged athletes through an “Ontario Card” designation. “Junior-aged athlete” is defined as those athletes who fall within the eligible age range for the Canada Games - 11 to 22 years of age. (Consideration will be given to older junior-aged athletes if a PSO/MSO’s NSO-approved Long Term Athlete Development model (LTAD) identifies older athletes in the “Train to Train” and “Train to Compete” categories). The intent of the OAAP is to provide funding to individual athletes based on their demonstrated commitment to high performance sport, allowing them to pursue athletic excellence at the highest levels of national and international competition.

How does it work?

In accordance with the OAAP guidelines, the Ontario Fencing Association is responsible for developing sport specific selection criteria and forming a Selection Committee that will apply the criteria to select those athletes who will be awarded Ontario Card status in 2008-2009. The Selection Criteria is approved by the Board of Directors and reviewed by MHP staff. Nominated athletes will be required to sign an Athlete Agreement between the athlete and Ontario Fencing Association. Carding status will be for one year starting April 1, 2008 ending March 31, 2009.

In 2008-2009, the Ministry of Health Promotion allocated a certain amount of OAAP Ontario Cards to each eligible Provincial Sport / Multi-Sport Organization (PSO/MSO). The Ontario Fencing Association has been allotted a total of 22 Ontario cards (split evenly as 11 male and 11 Female Cards).

OPTIONAL: the Ontario Fencing Association has also decided to exercise the option made available by MHP to split up to 30% of its carding allotment (i.e. issue ½ cards in designated categories).

A minimum of 70% of the Ontario cards will be allocated to what the Ministry of Health Promotion defines as junior-aged athletes (11 to 22 years of age). A maximum of 30% of the Ontario cards may be allocated to athletes no longer eligible for “junior athlete” status, (athletes 23 and over).

As a result, the 22 cards issued to the Ontario Fencing Association will be allocated as follows:

Cards will be specifically allocated to the following categories/disciplines:

In accordance with the OAAP guidelines the Ontario Fencing Association is responsible for forming a Selection Committee and sport specific selection criteria to nominate the athletes for Ontario carding status in 2008-2009. This selection criteria has been approved by the Ontario Fencing Association Board of Directors.

Committee Members have no known conflict of interest in regards to the Ontario Quest for Gold Program

How much funding is available?

The exact level of funding for the 2008-2009 carding year will be determined by the Ministry after the total number of athletes nominated for Ontario Card status has been determined. Funding will be released prior to March 31, 2009.

How will the ONTARIO FENCING ASSOCIATION Selection Committee decide who receives funding?

The Ontario Fencing Association Selection Committee will use both the Ministry of Health Promotion Eligibility Criteria and the Sport Specific selection criteria detailed below to determine which athletes will be nominated by the Ontario Fencing Association for Ontario Card status in 2008-2009:

Ontario Fencing Association
Quest Ontario Athlete Assistance Program
Sport Specific Athlete Selection Criteria

The sport specific athlete selection criteria will be utilized in the identification, ranking and selection of athletes for Ontario Cards. All athletes must meet the Ontario minimum athlete eligibility requirements to be considered for the QOAAP.

Ministry of Health Promotion Eligibility Criteria:

All athletes must also meet the Ministry of Health Promotion's minimum athlete eligibility criteria:

- Athlete must be a Canadian citizen or landed immigrant;
- Athlete must be a resident of Ontario for one year prior to his/her nomination for carding status, with the following exception;
The residency requirement will be waived if the athlete is a direct family member of:
 - a regular force member, or
 - a reservist as defined in subsection 1 (1) of the *Employment Standards Act, 2000* who is deployed under a circumstance described in clause 50.2 (1) (a) or (b) of that Act, or who is deployed or in any other way placed on active duty under a circumstance described in regulations made for the purposes of clause 50.2 (1) (c) of that Act.
- Athletes must be training and continuing to train in Ontario. Exceptions ("Residency Exceptions") will be made on a case specific basis providing that the athlete can substantiate that:
 - He/She cannot receive the required level of training in Ontario and is out of the province **temporarily** during the year (i.e. due to lack of facilities, coaching, competitions);
 - ▶ The onus is on the athlete to demonstrate that he/she needs to be out of province. The athlete will submit written documentation to their PSO/MSO's Selection Committee clearly indicating how they meet these exceptions. The Ministry may require that the athlete provide supporting documentation from the athlete's PSO/ NSO, National Sport Organization (NSO) or other sources to verify reasons for athlete's absence from the Province of Ontario.
 - He/She must attend a post-secondary institution out-of-province because the course of study is not available to him/her in Ontario;
 - It is more financially feasible to attend a post-secondary institution out-of-province, or other extenuating circumstances that require the athlete to be out of the province.
- Athlete must be a member in good standing with PSO/MSO and NSO where applicable.
- Athlete must demonstrate a commitment and dedication to a proper training and competitive program.
- Athlete must be instructed by a coach who has been trained and certified in the National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP) Level 2 or equivalent.
- Athlete must not be under sanction as per the Canadian Anti-Doping Policy.
- Athlete must be attending an educational institution full-time (i.e. primary and secondary schools)
 - Exceptions will be made providing that the athlete can substantiate that his/her training will not allow for full-time attendance or if an athlete requires special needs that preclude full or part-time attendance (e.g. Athlete with a disability (AWAD))
- Athletes who have completed their area of study at the secondary level (i.e. high school) and who continue to train towards participation in major national or international competitions will also be given consideration.
- If eligible, the athlete must compete, and continue to compete for Ontario for one year from the date of the Minister's letter informing the athlete of acceptance into OAAP program, at Canada Games and other national competitions involving provincial team competitions. Athletes who have achieved Canada Card status are not eligible for Ontario Cards.
- Eligibility will be limited to Ontario junior-aged athletes ("junior-aged" refers to chronological age, not a sport's specific age category - only exception is for PSO/MSOs using 30% of Ontario Card allotment for Sr. level athletes not funded by Sport Canada – see below) who have been identified as a next generation national team athlete as demonstrated by:
 - Identification within the NSO pool of identified next generation national team athletes for the

- last two competitive seasons; OR
- Results at regional championships, national championships (junior and/or senior) or other recognized national/international competitions over the last two competitive seasons; OR
- Representation on a Canadian National Team (developmental and/or junior). Athletes training for Canada Games or provincial teams may also be considered.

Sport Specific Eligibility Requirements

Minimum Standard

To be eligible for QOAAP, an athlete:

- Must hold a Competitive Membership with the Ontario Fencing Association and a CFF licence in the season in which they are applying for QOAAP.
- Must be a registered member and active participant in the Ontario Elite Team Program
- Must be working with minimum Level 3 NCCP certified coach (foreign-trained coaches who are recognised by the Ontario Fencing Association as working at a level equivalent to NCCP Level 3 are acceptable)

Only athletes who are not receiving Sport Canada AAP funding are eligible to be selected for the Quest Ontario Card

QOAAP Qualification Criteria

The qualification period will be March 31, 2008 to Dec. 31, 2008

The following criteria will be used to determine those athletes who are eligible to be selected for Quest Ontario Athlete Assistance Program: Eligibility does not imply automatic selection for funding. The athlete must meet the minimum standards for selection in order to be considered.

1. Senior Elite Team

Three male and three female athletes will qualify for selection in the following order

- 1) Athletes on the National HPPER (High Performance Program Eligibility Ranking) as of Dec. 31, 2008, with Athlete ID in order HP, A, B, JA
- 2) Athletes on the National HPPER (High Performance Program Eligibility Ranking) as of Dec. 31, 2008 in order of ranking
- 3) Athletes on the Ontario Senior Elite Ranking as of Dec. 31, 2008,
- 4) The fourth athlete in each gender will be named alternate and will be eligible to receive funding if one of the three selected athletes (male and female) declines or becomes ineligible.

The total of all points will be used for ranking.

2. Junior Elite Team (-20 age group)

Four male and four female athletes will qualify for selection in the following order:

- 1) Athletes born in 1989 or later (who are not already nominated), on the National HPPER (High Performance Program Eligibility Ranking) as of Dec. 31, 2008, with Athlete ID in

order HP, A, B, JA

- 2) Athletes born in 1989 or later (who are not already nominated), on the National HPPER (High Performance Program Eligibility Ranking) as of **Dec. 31, 2008** in order of ranking
- 3) athletes from the Ontario Junior Elite rankings, (who are not already nominated) as of **Dec. 31, 2008**, regardless of weapon, will be selected.
- 4) The fifth athlete in each gender will be named alternate and will be eligible to receive funding if one of the four selected athletes (male and female) declines or becomes ineligible.

3. Cadet Elite Team (-17 age group)

Four male and four female athletes will qualify for selection in the following order:

Athletes nominated in this category will be awarded Development Cards (see note)

- 1) Athletes born in 1992 or later (who are not already nominated), on the National HPPER (High Performance Program Eligibility Ranking) as of ***Dec. 31 2008***, with Athlete ID in order HP, A, B, JA
- 2) Athletes born in 1992 or later (who are not already nominated), on the National HPPER (High Performance Program Eligibility Ranking) as of ***Dec. 31, 2008*** in order of ranking
- 3) Athletes from the Ontario Cadet Elite rankings, (who are not already nominated) as of ***Dec. 31, 2008***, regardless of weapon, will be selected.
- 4) Athletes born in 1992 or later from the Ontario Cadet Elite Ranking (who are not already nominated) as of ***Dec. 31, 2008***, regardless of weapon, will be selected.
- 5) The fifth athlete in each gender will be named alternate and will be eligible to receive funding if one of the four selected athletes (male and female) declines or becomes ineligible.

Point Calculations

Number of points earned = points for place + size factor

Note that points can only be earned for fencers reaching the top 65% of the field (rounded up to the smallest integer), except for the Cadet Elite category. Eg. If there were 32 fencers in the competition, only the top 20 would get points. For Cadet Elite, 100% of the field will get points.

Cadet Elites who rank below 64 will acquire Size Factor points but no points for place.

Examples

- 40 fencers in the competition therefore 26 fencers get points $(40 \times 65\%) = 26$

Fencer A ranks 23

Points for place = 12

Size Factor = 20

Total Points for A = 32

Fencer B ranks 2

Points for place = 37

Size Factor = 20

Total Points for A = 57

- 130 fencers in the competition therefore 84 fencers get points $(130 \times 65\%) = 84$

Fencer A ranks 92

Only 84 fencers are awarded points

Total Points for A = 0

Fencer B ranks 16

Points for place = 19

Size Factor = 40

Total Points for A = 59

NOTES

1. Senior Elite Team Cards may total less than six if fewer than six meet the criteria
2. Cards not awarded in the Senior Category will be awarded to the Junior Elite Team Category for a total of 8 plus the number of extra cards
3. Junior Elite Team Cards may total less than 8 if fewer than 8 meet the criteria
Cards not awarded in the Junior Team Category will be awarded to the **Cadet Elite Category** for a total of 8 plus extra cards

Tie Breaking

Athlete ID

If more than one athlete has the same Athlete ID then the athlete with the highest international point totals will be nominated first.

Point Total

If the point totals are the same for two or more athletes, the one with the highest single international result on the same ranking will be ranked higher.

If after using the tie-breaking tools, a tie remains, a method of tie-breaking will be decided by the Ontario Fencing High Performance Committee.

Special notes:

Development Cards awarded in the Cadet Development category are split cards which means they are 50% of the Senior and Junior cards

Athletes who qualify in more than one category will be placed in the highest level achieved i.e. an athlete who qualifies in Sr Team and Jr. Team will be placed in the Sr. category. An athlete who qualifies in both Junior Team and Cadet Development Team will be placed in Junior

In the overall program gender equity will be maintained.

Definitions

QOAAP: Quest Ontario Athlete Assistance Program

Funding from the Ministry of Health Promotion for the purpose of financially assisting athletes who are training and competing to achieve National Team status and international results at the Senior, Junior, or Cadet level.

Ontario Elite Team Program:

A program of enhanced training and competition, delivered by the Ontario Fencing Association, to assist athletes to achieve national and international results, in the range of LTAD Train to Train and Train to Compete

Qualification Period:

A period during which results from designated competitions are used to identify eligible athletes for QOAAP

Eligibility Period:

The entire period of time from onset (April 1 2008) to issuing of cheques (Mar.31 2009) during which eligible athletes must show consistent participation in the Ontario Elite Team Program.

Ontario Elite Rankings

Senior, Junior, or Youth/Cadet results from designated competitions which are used for specific purposes such as QOAAP, Ontario Team selections, training camps, and other funding opportunities.

OSE – Ontario Senior Elite Ranking

OJE – Ontario Junior Elite Ranking

OYE – Ontario Cadet Elite Ranking

Application for Ontario Elite Team Programs

Deadline

Although applications can be made at any time during the season, athletes wishing to have the September 2008 CSC considered for ranking must apply prior to September 30 2008. Subsequently, only results acquired while an athlete is registered in the Ontario Elite Team program will be used for Elite rankings.

Ontario elite Team Agreements are sent out.

Ontario elite Team Agreements are signed and returned along with Annual Training and Competition Plan. Coaches and parents of athletes under 18 years of age must sign the agreements and originals must be returned by mail to the above address

As soon as the registration form is received in the OFA office, an athlete is considered an Elite Team member.

IMPORTANT NOTE Only registered Ontario Elite Team program athletes will be considered for Quest funding

Disqualification from Ontario Elite Team Program

Athletes may be disqualified from the Ontario Elite Team program for the following:

1. Failure to provide an appropriate Annual Training and Competition plan. In case of a dispute, the decision of the Ontario High Performance Committee and the Board of Directors will be final as to what constitutes appropriate.
2. Failure to comply with the Ontario Elite Program.
3. Refusing a Canadian Fencing Federation invitation to a National Team project or camp, unless for reasons of illness or injury, family emergency or other reason of serious concern as approved by the Ontario High Performance Committee.
4. Failure to follow the Athlete Code of Conduct as agreed to in the Program agreement
5. Positive test or other evidence of use of a banned substance

Infractions 3 and 5 mean automatic disqualification

Infractions 1, 2, and 4

Step 1

A letter of warning will be sent to the athlete and coach outlining the infraction and steps to take to remedy the situation

Step 2

If the situation has not been remedied a meeting will be called with the High Performance Committee, the athlete, the athlete's parent(s) if athlete is under 18, the identified coach or other representative to discuss a solution to the problem. Any expense incurred to attend the meeting will be the responsibility of the athlete.

Step Three

If no resolution has been found after steps one and two, a notice of disqualification will be issued to all parties.

Appeal

A letter of appeal may be filed within seven (7) days of the receipt of Notice of Disqualification. The letter must be sent to the Secretary of the Ontario Fencing Association. (see website www.fencingontario.ca for current Secretary.

The standard Ontario Fencing Association Appeal Policy will be followed.

Quest Nomination Process

- 1. All Ontario Elite Team members who qualify for the Quest Ontario Athlete Assistance Program informed by no later than January 19, 2009**
- 2. Athletes register on line with the program by February 4, 2009**
- 3. All Quest nominated athletes will also be required to sign a Quest Program Agreement and to return this document signed by all parties by February 4, 2009.**
- 4. Cheques will arrive in March or early April in one lump sum.**
- 5. Athletes will be required to adhere to Ontario Elite Team Agreements and Quest Agreements through to Sept. of the 2008-2009 season.**

Residency Exceptions:

Any athlete living/training outside of Ontario is required to **submit written documentation** to the PSO NAME HERE Selection Committee clearly identifying how they meet the following residency exceptions, identified in the Ministry of Health Promotion's General Eligibility Criteria:

- Athletes must be living and continuing to train in Ontario. Exceptions will be made on a case specific basis providing that the athlete can substantiate that:
 - He/She cannot receive the required level of training in Ontario and is out of the province **temporarily** during the year (i.e. due to lack of facilities, coaching, competitions);
 - He/She must attend a post-secondary institution out-of-province because the course of study is not available to him/her in Ontario;
 - It is more financially feasible to attend a post-secondary institution out-of-province, or other extenuating circumstances that require the athlete to be out of the province.

This information must be received by the Selection Committee by no later than **XXXXXXXXXX** in order to be considered.

Residency Exemption for Military Families: The one-year Ontario residency requirement is waived for any Ontario Card or Canada Card applicant who is a spouse or dependant of a: Regular Force member of the Canadian Forces; or Reservist currently deployed by the Canadian Forces into active service. This means that eligible military family members now qualify for OAAP funding immediately upon becoming residents of Ontario. Please see the 2008-2009 *Quest for Gold* Athlete Handbook for details of this exemption, including a list of documents needed to verify eligibility for this waiver of the one-year Ontario residency requirement .

Alternates:

PSO NAME HERE will also nominate alternates to those athletes nominated for Ontario Card status. Alternates will be those athletes who are ranked directly behind those athletes nominated for the allotment of Ontario Cards in a particular category/discipline. The names of alternates will be published along with the names of nominated athletes. If an athlete drops out or is removed from the OAAP an alternate will be substituted into that athlete's position, provide that:

- Alternate is substituted within 2008-2009 fiscal year
- An alternate is available from the same category/discipline/card level (Full/Half)

- Funding for athlete being substituted is still available within fiscal year (e.g. full funding for card has not already been paid out to athlete no longer in program)

The Ontario Fencing Association will publish or make known the athletes nominated for Ontario Card status by no later than **January 19, 2009**

Appeals

Athletes who have not been nominated and who wish to appeal this decision can do so by filing an appeal *in writing only* with the *Quest for Gold* Ontario Athlete Assistance Program Appeals Committee. Appeals will be dealt with by an Appeals Committee comprised of representatives from the sport community and chosen by the Ministry.

Appeals must be submitted through regular post, registered mail, in person or by courier and on the form provided. Appeals that are delivered personally or by courier shall be deemed to be received on the date of delivery. Appeals that are delivered by regular post or registered mail shall be deemed to be received three days after the date of mailing. **Appeals submitted by e-mail or fax will not be accepted.**

Note: Any/all information provided to the Appeals Committee may be shared with the athlete's PSO by the Appeals Committee.

Grounds for appeals will be limited strictly to:

- Whether or not the PSO/MSO has completed the selection process in accordance with their own published selection criteria and related procedures;
- Whether or not the selection criteria developed and applied by the PSO/MSO were fair, objective, transparent and free from discrimination or conflict of interest.

After hearing an appeal the Appeals Committee will have the authority to:

- Direct the PSO/MSO to redo the selection process using the correct criteria/process and submit new list of nominated athletes;
- Deny the appeal;
- Allow the appeal and nominate the appellant for carding status.

The deadline for athletes to submit appeals to the Appeals Committee is
